CHAP. 46.

Resolve respecting roads and bridges in Patricktown Plantation.

Approved March 18, 1830.

RESOLVED, That the Court of Sessions, in and for the County of Lincoln, be, and hereby are authorized to expend in repairing any county roads, now located in Patricktown Plantation, in said county, and in repairing any bridge, or bridges, crossing any river over which such roads may pass, such sum or sums of money, as they may from time to time adjudge to be necessary and proper, and to appoint one or more agents to superintend the expenditure of the same. And said Court are hereby authorized to add to their estimates of county taxes, such sum as they may from time to time order to be expended as aforesaid. This Resolve shall continue and be in force two years, from and after the passage thereof, and no longer.

CHAP. 47.

Resolve providing compensation to the Chaplains of the Legislature.

Approved March 18, 1830.

RESOLVED, That there be allowed and paid out of the Treasury to the Rev. Stephen Lovell, chaplain of the Senate thirty dollars; to the Rev. Elijah Kellogg, chaplain to the House three dollars; Ichabod Nichols three dollars; Samuel Rand, three dollars; P. S. TenBroeck, five dollars; Charles Jenkins, four dollars; Stephen Lovell, four dollars; Bennet Tyler, four dollars; Eben'r. Thresher, five dollars; William H. Norris, two dollars; Robert Blake, four dollars; William I. Reese, four dollars; ---which sums are in full for their respective services.
