Chapter 21.

Resolve, additional to a Resolve for a special term of the Supreme Judicial Court, in the County of Somerset.

Approved February 26, 1831.

Resolved, by the Senate and House of Representatives, in Legislature assembled, That the Court, at the special term provided for by the Resolve to which this is additional, shall have no authority to take cognizance of any actions appealed or original, or any matters and things, excepting such as are now entered and depending in said Court; and that all appeals, which have been or may be claimed, from judgments rendered in the Court of Common Pleas, in said County, to said Supreme Judicial Court, and all recognizances, which have been taken, and all writs, precepts, processes, and commissions, made returnable, or by law returnable, at the regular term of said Supreme Judicial Court, to be holden in said County on the first Tuesday of June next, shall then and there be entered, returned, filed, have day, and be proceeded upon, as if the Resolve to which this is additional had never been passed.

Chapter 22.

Resolve authorizing the Governor to settle with William Vance, Esq.

Approved March 3, 1831.

Resolved, That the Governor with advice of Council, be, and hereby is authorized to settle all claims and demands between this State and William Vance, Esq. which have arisen in consequence of a contract between the State and said Vance, which was made on the eighth day of February, in the year of our Lord eighteen hundred and twenty eight, in pursuance of a Resolve passed by the Legislature, on the twenty fourth day of January preceding, and also all other claims and demands between the State and said Vance; and for this purpose to appoint one or more suitable persons, as an examining committee, whose duty it shall be to proceed to the Baring and Houlton road, examine survey and measure the same, ascertain what said Vance has done on said road, and what it is worth, whether more or less than three hundred dollars per mile; -also to examine the land appropriated by said Resolve for making said road, and to ascertain as near as may be, the value thereof—to make a correct survey of said
