Twenty Five Thousand Dollars, to be paid, in gold or silver, into said Bank, on or before the first day of June next; and also further to increase said capital stock, by adding thereto the sum of Twenty Five Thousand Dollars, to be paid in gold or silver, into said Bank, on or before the first day of October next: said additional capital to be divided into shares of One Hundred Dollars each. And loans may be made by said Bank, upon said additional capital, whenever the Directors, or a majority of them, together with the Cashier, shall have signed, and verified by oath, and filed in the office of the Secretary of State, a certificate that said additional capital has actually been so paid into said Bank.

Additional Capital to be divided into shares of \$100 each.

Loans may be made when said Capital shall have been paid in, and certificate thereof filed in the office of the Secretary of State.

CHAPTER 305.

AN ACT for the preservation of the Piscataquis Union Bridge.

Approved February 7, 1833.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives, in Legislature assembled, That if any person, after the first day of April next, shall willingly ride or drive any horse or horses, faster than a walk, across or upon the Piscataquis Union Bridge, between the towns of Atkinson and Sebec, he shall forfeit and pay the sum of one dollar, for every such offence; *Provided,* That, at each end of said bridge, the towns aforesaid shall keep, in a conspicuous place, a board or sign, on which the substance of this Act shall be plainly and legibly printed.
