## CHAPTER 387.

AN ACT further in addition to incorporate the Maine Stage Company.

Approved January 15, 1834.

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives, in Legislature assembled,* That from and after the passing of this Act, the Maine Stage Company shall be entitled, to take and hold any real and personal estate to the value of Sixty Thousand Dollars, including the present capital, and be authorized and empowered to employ the same in establishing and maintaining lines of Stages upon the roads between Portland and Bath, Brunswick and Augusta, and Portland and Augusta subject to the limitations and restrictions contained in the proviso to the Act to incorporate the Maine Stage Company passed February tenth eighteen hundred and twenty three.

Maine Stage Company enabled to hold property to the amount of 60,000 dollars.

## CHAPTER 388.

AN ACT to incorporate the Hallowell Harmonic Society.

Approved January 21, 1834.

SECT. 1. *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives, in Legislature assembled,* That Paul Stickney, John D. Lord, John Ladd, Samuel Thing, Thomas B. Merrick, John N. Stickney, J. D. Robinson, Franklin A. Day, A. D. Jones, S. Nelson, Hiram Albee, Daniel D. Lakeman, John P. Child, Sanford A. Kingsbury, H. G. O. Washburn, D. W. Smith, Mark Johnson, Samuel Lock, Charles Vaughan, Jr., William Bray, George Webber, Daniel Heard, S. W. Robinson, S. F. Goodwin, together with their associates and successors, be and they hereby are, constituted a body corporate, by the name of the Hallowell Harmonic Society, with power to prosecute and defend suits at law; to have and use a common seal, to make and enforce any by-laws and regulations for the management of their affairs,

not repugnant to the laws of the State; to take, hold and use any estate, real or personal, not to exceed Five Thousand Dollars; and said corporation shall have power to lease, sell or convey or otherwise dispose of their funds, as may best promote the objects of their association, and have all the rights and powers usually granted to corporations.

First meeting,

SECT. 2. *Be it further enacted*, That the first meeting of said corporation shall be held at such time and place, and notified in such manner as Paul Stickney and John D. Lord, two of the above named persons may direct.

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### CHAPTER 389.

✦ AN ACT to incorporate the Stroudwater Mill Dam Company.

Approved January 21, 1834.

Persons incor-  
porated.

SECT. 1. *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives, in Legislature assembled*, That Jacob Hunt, Thomas Seal, Jonatban Smith, Moses Quimby, Charles Bartlett, John M. Brewer, William H. Gardiner and Silas Broad with their associates and successors be and they hereby are created a body corporate by the name of the Stroudwater Mill Dam Company with power to erect and maintain a Mill Dam across Fore River on the northerly side of the long bridge at Stroudwater village in the town of Westbrook, and to purchase and hold such estate real and personal as may be necessary to carry the object aforesaid into complete effect, and with all other powers usually granted or incident to similar corporations.

SECT. 2. *Be it further enacted*, That Jacob Hunt be and hereby is authorized to call the first meeting of said Company, by giving each member thereof a notice in writing setting forth the time, place and purpose of said meeting which notice shall be served at least seven days prior to said meeting at which meeting it shall be lawful for the
