to Calais by the way of Dennysville, Pembroke and Eastport, with power to prosecute and defend suits at law, to have a common seal, make by-laws for the management of the Company, not inconsistent with the laws of the State; take and hold any real and personal estate, to an amount not exceeding Forty Thousand Dollars at any one time; and the same convey at pleasure, and generally to have, exercise and enjoy all the privileges, rights and powers usually granted to similar corporations; and the said James Thomas may convene the first meeting of said corporation, first giving to his associates such notice as he may think suitable.

CHAPTER 403.

AN ACT in addition to an Act entitled an Act to incorporate the Canal Bank.

Approved January 31, 1834.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives, in Legislature assembled, That the number of Directors in the Canal Bank from and after the passage of this Act, shall consist only of seven, four of whom shall constitute a quorum, any thing in the Act to which this is in addition, to the contrary notwithstanding.

Number of Directors to consist of seven.

CHAPTER 404.

AN ACT to incorporate the town of Marion.

Approved January 31, 1834.

SECT. 1. *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives, in Legislature assembled,* That the Plantation numbered thirteen, East division of lands in the county of Washington, bounded on the North by Plantation No. fourteen, on the East by the town of Edmunds, on the South by Whiting, and on the West by Plantation No.
