CHAPTER 412.

AN ACT to cede to the United States of America, jurisdiction over the Arsenal in the town of Augusta.

Approved February 3, 1834.

SECT. 1. *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives, in Legislature assembled,* That there be and hereby is ceded to the United States of America, the jurisdiction of a certain tract or parcel of land lying in said Augusta, on the East side of Kennebec River, and bounded thus beginning at said river at low water mark, in the line between the land herein described and land of Henry Sewall, at a point from which a line drawn South sixty seven and one quarter degrees East, will strike a stone set in the ground at the distance of about five rods from low water mark, which stone is marked U. S. No. 1—thence running South sixty seven, and one quarter degrees East, by compass, and by the fence, as now erected, on the line between the premises described and Henry Sewall's land, one hundred and six rods, to the public road, leading from Kennebec Bridge to Pittston, where a stone is set in the ground, and marked U. S. No. 2—thence Northeasterly by the West side of said road thirty rods, to another stone set in the ground marked U. S. No. 3, and thence North sixty seven and one quarter degrees West, one hundred and six rods to low water mark in Kennebec river in which line at the distance of about five rods from low water mark another stone is set in the ground marked U. S. No. 4—and thence Southerly by said river to the bounds first mentioned. Also the road and passage way three rods wide, from said lot to Kennebec Bridge, as expressed in the deed of John H. Hartwell and wife to the President of the

Also the road and passage way from said lot to Kennebec bridge.

United States dated the twenty fifth day of September in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and twenty seven.

SECT. 2. *Be it further enacted*, That this State shall have concurrent jurisdiction with the United States in and over said tract of land, road and the buildings thereon, so far, that all criminal and civil processes issued under the authority of this State or any officer thereof, may be executed on any part of said premises, or in any buildings thereon or that may be erected thereon, in the same way and manner as if the jurisdiction aforesaid had not been granted.

Civil and criminal process under the authority of this State to be executed on said premises as if jurisdiction had not been granted.

CHAPTER 413.

AN ACT to annex Crotch Island to the town of Cushing.

Approved February 5, 1834.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives, in Legislature assembled, That an Island called and known by the name of Crotch Island containing about sixty three acres of land, situate in the town of Friendship and in a river of the same name, in the County of Lincoln, owned and occupied by Robert Gay and George Davis, be and the same is hereby set off from said town of Friendship and annexed to said town of Cushing.

CHAPTER 414.

AN ADDITIONAL ACT relative to the Maine Charitable Mechanic Association.

Approved February 5, 1834.

SECT. 1. *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives, in Legislature assembled*, That the Charter of said Corporation be and the same hereby is extended for the period of twenty years, from and after the term of twenty years, mentioned in the Act to which this in addition.

Charter extended twenty years.
