## CHAPTER 425.

AN ACT to incorporate the town of Cambridge.

Approved February 8, 1834.

SECT. 1. *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives, in Legislature assembled,* That all that part of the town of Ripley in the county of Somerset, which lies Northerly and Westerly of the following described line, to wit: A line drawn through the channel of Maine Stream so called, constituting the head waters of the Sebesticook river, and extending along the channel of said Maine Stream from the West to the East line of said town of Ripley, and at the distance of one third part of the width of said stream from the Northerly bank thereof, with the inhabitants thereof, be and hereby is set off from said town of Ripley and incorporated into a town by the name of Cambridge, with all the rights and privileges which the towns in this State enjoy.

Boundaries.

Corporate name.

SECT. 2. *Be it further enacted,* That the town of Ripley aforesaid, shall assume and pay all claims which now exist, and shall pay and discharge all costs and damages which have, or may hereafter arise, by reason of any suits at law or controversies, against the same; and that all moneys which have been raised and assessed by the said town for the years eighteen hundred and thirty two and eighteen hundred and thirty three, and which remain due and unpaid at the time of the passage of this Act, shall be paid into the Treasury thereof, and shall be considered as belonging exclusively to said town; and that all personal property owned by said town, including, debts due and moneys on hand, shall be received and appropriated to the sole use and benefit of the same.

Town of Ripley to assume all claims which now exist and costs and damages which may arise and to receive and appropriate all personal property, debts due and money on hand, &amp;c.

SECT. 3. *Be it further enacted,* That all the public lands, and school funds in said town of Ripley shall be divided between said towns of Ripley and Cambridge in proportion to the number of acres of land in said towns respectively.

Public lands and school funds to be divided in proportion to the number of acres of land in each town.

## MANUFACTURERS' SAVINGS BANK.

Paupers having a legal settlement in the town of Ripley Sept. 26th, 1833, to belong to that town.

SECT. 4. *Be it further enacted,* That all persons now being or hereafter becoming chargeable as paupers, and who had gained a lawful settlement in said town of Ripley on the twenty sixth day of September eighteen hundred and thirty three, shall be considered as belonging to that town, on whose territory they may have gained such settlement, and shall be supported by the same.

Town of Ripley authorized to assess and collect State and County tax as if this act had not passed till a new State valuation.

SECT. 5. *Be it further enacted,* That the said town of Ripley shall have power, until a new general State valuation be taken, to assess the polls and estates of the inhabitants, and the non-resident proprietors of land included within the territory hereby set off and incorporated, for their just proportion of State and County Taxes, in the same way and manner, as if this Act had not passed; and the Treasurer thereof for the time being is hereby authorized to receive, demand and recover the same, to the use of said town.

First town meeting, how notified.

SECT. 6. *Be it further enacted,* That any Justice of the Peace for the county of Somerset is hereby empowered to issue his warrant to some inhabitant of said town of Cambridge, directing him to notify the inhabitants thereof to meet at a time and place in said warrant specified, to choose such officers and transact such business as towns are authorized to choose and to do, at their annual meetings.

## CHAPTER 426.

AN ACT to incorporate the Manufacturers' Savings Bank.

Approved February 11, 1834.

Names of persons incorporated.

SECT. 1. *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives, in Legislature assembled,* That Job Harris, Thomas B. Parks, John A. Burleigh, Charles W. Woodman, Charles E. Bartlett, Thomas Shapleigh, Isaac L. Folsom, Charles C. P. Moody, Richard Kimball and Frederick Cogswell and such others as may associate with them, be and they
