CHAPTER 425.

AN ACT to incorporate the town of Cambridge.

Approved February 8, 1834.

SECT. 1. Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives, in Legislature assembled, That all that part of the town of Ripley in the county of Somerset, which lies Northerly and Westerly of the following described line, to Boundaries. wit : A line drawn through the channel of Maine Stream so called, constituting the head waters of the Sebasticook river, and extending along the channel of said Maine Stream from the West to the East line of said town of Ripley, and at the distance of one third part of the width of said stream from the Northerly bank thereof, with the inhabitants thereof, be and hereby is set off from said town of Ripley and incorporated into a town by the name of Corporate Cambridge, with all the rights and privileges which the name. towns in this State enjoy.

Be it further enacted, That the town of Rip-SECT. 2. ley aforesaid, shall assume and pay all claims which now to assume all exist, and shall pay and discharge all costs and damages now exist and which have, or may hereafter arise, by reason of any suits costs and damaat law or controversies, against the same; and that all arise and to remoneys which have been raised and assessed by the said town for the years eighteen hundred and thirty two and personal propeighteen hundred and thirty three, and which remain due and money on and unpaid at the time of the passage of this Act, shall be paid into the Treasury thereof, and shall be considered as belonging exclusively to said town; and that all personal property owned by said town, including, debts due and moneys on hand, shall be received and appropriated to the sole use and benefit of the same.

SECT. 3. SECT. 4. Be it further enacted, That all persons now Paupers having being or hereafter becoming chargeable as paupers, and ment in the town who had gained a lawful settlement in said town of Ripley of Ripley Sept. 26th, 1833, to on the twenty sixth day of September eighteen hundred belong to that and thirty three, shall be considered as belonging to that town, on whose territory they may have gained such settlement, and shall be supported by the same.

Be it further enacted, That the said town of SECT. 5. Town of Ripley Ripley shall have power, until a new general State valuaauthorized to as-sess and collect tion be taken, to assess the polls and estates of the inhab-State and Coun- itants, and the non-resident proprietors of land included acthadnot pass- within the territory hereby set off and incorporated, for State valuation, their just proportion of State and County Taxes, in the same way and manner, as if this Act had not passed ; and the Treasurer thereof for the time being is hereby authorized to receive, demand and recover the same, to the use of said town.

> SECT. 6. Be it further enacted, That any Justice of the Peace for the county of Somerset is hereby empowered to issue his warrant to some inhabitant of said town of Cambridge, directing him to notify the inhabitants thereof to meet at a time and place in said warrant specified, to choose such officers and transact such business as towns are authorized to choose and to do, at their annual meetings.
