Chapter 4.

Resolve for the relief of Edward J. Gay.

Approved February 1, 1834.

Resolved, That there be paid out of the Treasury of the State the sum of Fifty Dollars to Edward J. Gay, on account of an injury sustained by him, while performing military duty.

Chapter 5.

Resolve for the relief of Timothy Hall Junior.

Approved February 8th, 1834.

Resolved, That there be paid, annually, out of the Treasury of the State, to Timothy Hall Junior, a pension of Four Dollars per month, to commence from the first day of January one thousand eight hundred and thirty four, and continue during the pleasure of the Legislature, it being on account of an injury, sustained by him while performing military duty.

Chapter 6.

Resolve providing for the printing and distribution of Blank Returns of Votes.

Approved February 8, 1834.

Resolved, That the Secretary of State cause to be printed and transmitted to the Town Clerks of the several towns, and to the Plantation Clerks of the several plantations in this State, such number of blank returns of votes for Governor, prescribed in a Resolve of March thirteenth, eighteen hundred and twenty one, as will be sufficient for five years, with the addition of a blank superscription as follows, viz: To — Esquire, Secretary of State. This contains a list of votes given by the inhabitants of the [town or plantation, as the case may be] of — for Governor, on the second Monday of September, 183 . Sealed up in open [town or plantation] meeting by — Selectmen
