BURYING GROUNDS.-RELIEF, &c. OF POOR.

Chapter 148.

AN ACT to protect Family Burying Grounds.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives, in Legislature assembled, That when any person or number of persons has now appropriated a piece of land for a place of burial and from attachment fenced the same or shall within six months from the and unalienable passage of this Act, fence the same and shall keep up tain conditions. the fence after its erection, and not use said piece of land for the purposes of cultivation, the same shall be exempted from attachment and levy of execution and unalienable by the proprietor or proprietors and their heir sat law and indivisible among said proprietors or their said heirs, so long as the same shall be kept fenced and occupied as a burying ground, unless all interested therein consent to an alienation or division thereof:-Provided that the piece of land so Proviso. appropriated shall not exceed one half acre, and the person or persons who has or have so appropriated it, shall within six months as aforesaid cause a written description thereof under his, her or their hands, attested by two disinterested witnesses, to be recorded in the registry of deeds in the County where the land is situated.

Chapter 149.

AN ACT additional to "an Act ascertaining what shall constitute the legal settlement, and providing for the relief and support, employment and removal of the poor."
