### CHAPTER 565.

AN ACT to repeal an Act to annex to the town of New Portland, sundry lots of Land lying in New Vineyard.

Approved March 12, 1835.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives, in Legislature assembled, That an Act passed March fourth one repealed, thousand eight hundred and thirty-four, entitled "An Act to annex to the Town of New Portland sundry lots of land lying in New Vineyard," be and the same is hereby repealed.

#### CHAPTER 566.

AN ACT to incorporate the Wells Mutual Marine Insurance Company,

Approved March 12, 1835.

Sect. 1. Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives, in Legislature assembled, That Seth Hatch, War- Names of persons wick Hobbs, Samuel Curtis, Jr., John Wheelwright, Daniel Wheelwright, Jr., and their associates and successors shall be, and they are hereby created a body corporate by the name of the Wells Mutual Marine Insurance Company, Corporate name. with power, by that name to prosecute and defend suits at Powers, &c. law-to have and use a common seal-to make by-laws, and regulations, for the management of their affairs, not repugnant to the laws of the State; to purchase and hold
