**Chapter 76.**

Resolve authorizing Attornies in the Court of Common Pleas to practice Law in the Supreme Judicial Court in certain cases.

Approved March 24, 1835.

**RESOLVED**, That all persons who have been admitted to practice law in the Court of Common Pleas and now hold a regular standing at the bar of said Court, are hereby authorized to practice law in the Supreme Judicial Court in the management of all cases wherein the said Supreme Judicial Court may have concurrent jurisdiction with the Court of Common Pleas, but not in the arguing of questions of law in said Supreme Judicial Court until they are admitted so to do, at the same time and manner and subject to the same duties as heretofore.

**Chapter 77.**

Resolve for establishing a Board of Internal Improvements.

Approved March 24, 1835.

**RESOLVED**, That the Governor, members of the Council and Land Agent of this State for the time being, be and hereby are constituted a Board of Internal Improvements, for the State of Maine, for the purposes, and with the powers hereinafter named. It shall be the duty of said Board to cause to be explored, and examined the great water courses of the State, and also any other parts of the State where in their judgment important improvements may be made for the benefit of the State, and for this purpose the Board is authorized to employ a Civil Engineer or Surveyor, and necessary Assistants who shall report the nature of the soil and its mineral and other indications of substances that may be useful to the State :—*Provided however*, That, only two members of said Board shall at the same time and on the same route act on any exploring committee, and such members shall for their services in exploring, receive a reasonable compensation. The Governor shall be President of the Board. All applications to the State for
