Chapter 237.

AN ACT to encourage the culture of Silk within this State.

Sect. 1. Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives, in Legislature assem-A bounty of 5 bled, That for every pound of Cocoons, which shall every Cocoon be raised within this State, the person who shall raised. raise, or cause to be raised said Cocoons, shall receive a bounty of five cents, from the Treasurer of the town or plantation, wherein said Cocoons shall -and for every pound of silk, which shall be reeled therefrom reeled from Cocoons, raised in this State the person who shall reel or cause the same to be reeled, shall receive from the Treasurer of the town or plantation.

Sect. 2. Be it further enacted, That before Proof to be given to Treasurer any person shall be entitled to receive the bounties of town and oath herein provided, he, she, or they, shall prove to the not before been satisfaction of the said Treasurer of the Town. or paid on said co- Plantation. in which such Cocoons shall be raised. or Silk reeled, that the same was raised or reeled. or caused to be raised or reeled by him, her, or them, as the case may be; and the person so presenting the same to the said Treasurer, for the purpose of receiving said bounty, shall make oath or affirmation, that no bounty had been received by any person for the Cocoons or Silk so presented for a bounty.

Treasurer of towns to present the amount for bounties paid.

SECT. 3. Be it further enacted, That the Treasurers of the several towns and plantations, to Legislature may keep an account of the money by them paid out by virtue of this Act, and present the same, verified by their oath or affirmation, to the Legislature next after the payment of any bounty as aforesaid, for allowance, and the Legislature after being satisfied of the correctness of such account, shall allow the same, and authorize the payment thereof from the Treasury of the State.
