Chapter 306.

AN ACT additional to an Act for the due regulation of weights and measures.

Fees of sealers
of weights and
measures.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, That the sealers of weights and measures, who may hereafter be appointed in the several towns and cities in this State, in pursuance of the provisions of the act to which this is additional, shall be entitled to demand and receive, for trying and proving by said town and city standards, and sealing as in said act is provided, the following fees, to wit: Four cents for each beam, weight and measure found to be not conformable to said standards—and two cents for each beam, weight and measure found to be conformable thereto—said fees to be paid by the person or persons whose weights, measures and beams shall be compared as aforesaid.

Chapter 307.

AN ACT exempting farming tools and other articles from attachment on mesne process or execution.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, That one plough of the value of ten dollars, one cart of the value of twenty-five dollars, one harrow of the value of five dollars, and all necessary hand farming tools of the value of ten dollars; and one cooking stove of the val-
