until the same shall actually be reduced; and the President and Directors of said bank may appropriate such real estate, held by mortgage or otherwise, and stock reduced, so much of the debts due the bank, including paper how paid stockholders. past due and doubtful, and such other property and funds as they may think proper, to the payment of the stock now authorized to be reduced; and when said real estate is disposed of and said debts are collected, shall pay out the same to the stockholders, from time to time, on account of the stock hereby reduced; and after the certificate filed in the Secretary's After certificate filed in Secreta-office, required by the first section of this Act, of such rys office tax on \$100,000. reduction, said corporation shall be held to pay the tax only on the sum of one hundred thousand dollars, the remaining capital stock of said bank. Chapter 107.

AN ACT in relation to Ornamental Trees.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, That the surveyors of highways are hereby authorized, under the Five per cent. direction of the Selectmen, Mayor and Aldermen of of highway tax may be expend their respective towns and cities, to expend an amount, ed in planting shade trees &c. not exceeding five per cent. of the tax committed to said surveyors for collection, in planting trees for shade and ornament, about the public burying grounds, commons, squares and highways, within the limits of their respective districts, provided their respective in favor of such expending spring meetings. Chapter 108.

AN ACT additional to an Act incorporating the town of Arrowsic.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, That the Act, when to take incorporating the town of Arrowsic, shall go into effect and become a law, from and after the time this Act shall have been approved by the Governor. [Approved March 2, 1841.]

Chapter 109.

AN ACT to authorize the Committee of the First Parish in Camden to dispose of their ministerial lot.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, That Charles R. Porter, Joseph Jones and William Carlton be, and the same hereby are authorized and empowered, as sell, convey, &c. the committee of the First Congregational Parish in Camden, to sell and convey by deed their ministerial lot of land, to any person or persons, and dispose of the proceeds as the said parish may direct. [Approved March 2, 1841.]

Chapter 110.

AN ACT to prevent the destruction of Salmon in Denny's River, County of Washington.

Section 1. Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, That from and after the passage of this Act, it shall be law-Committee to be ful for the inhabitants of the towns of Dennysville and chosen annually Edmunds, in the County of Washington, at their annual meeting, to choose a committee of three persons in each of said towns, who shall be inhabitants of the town in which they are respectively chosen, whose Their duty. duty it shall be to attend to the preservation of the fish, called salmon, in Denny's River.

SECT. 2. Be it further enacted, That if Taking, certain person shall wilfully take, kill, or destroy, by any periods, prohib- way or means whatever, any salmon in said Denny's River, or in the tide water within five miles of the head of the tide in said river, between sun-setting on
