Legislature may ciation: Provided, nevertheless, that the powers restrict, &c. herein granted may be enlarged, restricted or annulled at the pleasure of the Legislature.

SECT. 2. Be it further enacted, That the first meeting of said society may be called at such time and place as may be deemed best, by any three of the members herein named, and on such notice as they may deem reasonable.

AN ACT to alter the name of the town of Chandlerville.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, That from and after the passage of this Act, the town of Chandlerville, in the County of Somerset, shall be known and called by the name of Detroit.

Chapter 130.

AN ACT to set off Moses Hubbard from Berwick to South Berwick.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, That the lot of land, on which the dwelling house, occupied by Moses Hubbard and owned by John Hubbard, containing three acres and one hundred and eight rods, partly in Berwick and partly in South Berwick, bounded as follows, to wit: Beginning at a line between said Berwick and South Berwick where it crosses the Salmon Falls road, thence running by said road north forty-five degrees west nine rods and fifteen links to land owned by Miranda Volentine, thence by said Miranda Volentine's land north fifty-four degrees east fifty rods

and fourteen links to land of Benjamin Nason, thence south twenty-eight degrees east twelve rods, thence to the first mentioned bounds, with the dwelling house and other buildings standing on that part of said lot in the said town of Berwick, be and the same are hereby set off from the town of Berwick and annexed to the to So. Berwick town of South Berwick, in the County of York.

Chapter 131.

AN ACT to annex a part of the town of Alna to the town of Dresden.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, That from and after the passage of this Act, all that part of the town of Alna which lies, (according to the report of the Commissioners, appointed by the Supreme Judicial Court, holden at Wiscasset, within and for the County of Lincoln, in September in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and thirty-five,) within the following boundaries, viz: beginning at the stone Boundaries. monument, set up by said commissioners in the north line of the town of Dresden and marked A. D. thence running south forty-one degrees fifty minutes west five hundred and twenty-eight rods to another stone monument marked A. D. thence south sixty-six degrees east one hundred and ten rods to a third stone monument, marked as aforesaid, thence in a straight line to the monument started from or first mentioned, be and the same hereby is annexed to the town of Dresden: Provided, that the inhabitants of the territory above Proviso. described, and the proprietors of non-resident lands situated thereon, shall be holden to pay to the town of Taxes assessed, Alna all taxes, which have been legally assessed upon to be paid, &c. them prior to the passing of this Act, and all persons who now are, or may become chargeable as paupers, and who have gained a legal settlement on the Paupers, where to be supported. territory, herein described, shall be considered as be-
