Chapter 135.

RESOLVE for securing to plantations and unorganized places their portions of school money.

Resolved, That the Treasurer of the State be authorized and required to pay to the treasurers of the several Counties in the State, the sums, which have been, or may hereafter be appropriated to the several unincorporated and unorganized plantations in their respective Counties.

State Treasurer to pay County treasurers sch'l money for unincorporated, &c. plantations.

Resolved, That the several County treasurers be required to pay the assessors or treasurer of all organized plantations, and to the agents appointed by the inhabitants of unorganized places, within their respective Counties, such sums as have been apportioned to said plantations or places for the use of primary schools.

County treasurers to pay same to plantations, &c.
