Chapter 16.

AN ACT to set off a part of Denmark, and annex the same to Bridgton.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows :

The following described tract of land is hereby set off from the town of Denmark, in the county of Oxford and annexed to Bridgton, in the county of Cumberland, viz: beginning on the line between the counties of Oxford and Cumberland at the easterly corner of the lot lately owned by George Rounds and now occupied by Rebecca Rounds in said Denmark, and from thence south westerly on the south easterly line of the land of said Rounds to the waters of great Moose pond; thence northerly, on the easterly shore of said pond to the county line aforesaid, at the northerly corner of a gore of land now or recently owned by Barnabas Brackett; thence south easterly on said county and town line to the first bound.

Chapter 17.

AN ACT to provide in part for the expenditures of government.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows :

In order to provide for the operation of certain acts and resolves of the legislature, requiring the payment of money from the treasury, and also to provide for the necessary expenditures of the government, for the current year, the following sums are hereby appropriated, to be paid out of any moneys in the treasury; the same to be in lieu of all other existing appropriations whatever. And the governor, with advice of the council is hereby authorized, at any time prior to the first day of January next, to draw his warrant upon the treasury for the same.

Appropriation of money for certain purposes.

Governor may draw his warrant prior to Jan. 1, 1843.

Chapter 18.

AN ACT to incorporate the Gardiner Mechanic Association.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows :

John Robinson, John Berry, jun'r., Charles H. Partridge, John Webb, Charles A. Robbins, with their associates and successors, are incorporated as a body politic, by the name of the Gardiner Mechanic Association, with all the powers usually granted to similar corporations, and with leave to hold real and personal property, the annual income of which shall not exceed the sum of one thousand dollars.

Chapter 19.

AN ACT to extend the time for closing the concerns of the Frankfort Bank.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows :

The provisions of the third section of an act, entitled, "an act additional to an act to repeal the charters of the Globe, Citizens', and Frankfort Banks," approved April sixteenth, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and forty one, so far as the same relates to the assets of said Frankfort Bank, hereby are extended until the first day of April, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and forty four.

Time for closing the concerns of the Frankfort Bank extended to April 1, 1844.
