Chapter 1.

Resolve in favor of Daniel Libby.

Resolved, That there be allowed and paid from the treasury, Daniel Libby, out of any moneys not otherwise appropriated, to Daniel Libby, of Augusta, the sum of twenty four dollars in full for his services, For services as messenger. (including the assistants and page) as messenger of the house of representatives, during the four first days of the session of the present legislature; and for preparing the house for the reception of the members.

Chapter 2.

Resolve providing for the promulgation of the laws of the state.

Resolved, That "The Age," a newspaper printed in Augusta, The Age constibe and the same hereby is declared to be the public newspaper in this state; in which shall be published the laws and resolves of a public nature; and also all advertisements, notices and orders. required by law to be published in the public newspaper of the printer to the state.

Resolved, That all resolves or parts of resolves, inconsistent Resolves inconherewith, be and the same are hereby repealed; provided, that the Proviso. Portland Advertiser shall be continued a public newspaper so long as may be necessary to complete the publication of any notice or order already published in said paper, and for no other purpose.

Resolved, That these resolves shall take effect from and after when to take eftheir approval.
