Chapter 38.

Resolve in favor of Ira Fish.

Resolved, That the right is hereby granted to Ira Fish, to build a mill on lot number twenty seven, in township number nine in the sixth range, west from the east line of the state, instead of building said mill on lot number twenty six, in said township, as designated by the board of internal improvements.

Chapter 39.

Resolve to correct a clerical error in the valuation of the town of Sanford, and for correcting the state and county tax on said town.

Valuation of the town of Sanford corrected.

Resolved, That so much of a resolve, passed on the thirteenth day of April, in the year of our Lord, eighteen hundred and forty one, as relates to the valuation of the town of Sanford, in the county of York and to the aggregate valuation of said county, be repealed, and that the valuation of said town be three hundred, twenty thousand, six hundred and thirteen dollars; and that the aggregate valuation of said county be seven million, seven hundred, thirty one thousand, five hundred and forty two dollars; and that the treasurer of the state, and the treasurer of the county of York, be hereby directed to abate or refund, as the case may require, to the said town of Sanford, such portion of the state and county tax respectively, which may have been assessed, as the above correction in the valuation of said town of Sanford may require.

Chapter 40.

Resolve in favor of Thomas Sawyer, junior.

Gov. and Council authorized to audit claim of T. Sawyer, Jr.

Resolved, That the claim of Thomas Sawyer, Jr., for services as surveyor general of this state, be referred to the governor and council, with instructions to allow said claim, if they shall find it due to said claimant; and the governor is authorized to draw his warrant for so much as shall be allowed to him as aforesaid.
