1844.

Chapter 129.

AN ACT authorizing the assessment of a state tax on the town of Hanover.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows :

The treasurer of state shall forthwith issue his warrant, directed to the assessors of the town of Hanover, in the county of Oxford, requiring them to assess the sum of one hundred and sixteen dollars and eighty nine cents, upon the polls and estates of said town, according to the principals of the tax act, approved on the twenty fourth day of March, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and forty three; and also requiring said sum to be collected and paid into the state treasury, on or before the first day of September, in the year one thousand eight hundred and forty four; the said sum being the amount, for which the said town of Hanover ought to have been assessed in and by virtue of said tax act.

Treasurer to issue his warrant to assessors of town of Hanover.

Tax of \$116 89.

To be paid into the state treasury on or before Sept. 1, 1844.

Chapter 130.

AN ACT for the relief of the town of Bethel and of the plantation, called Howard's gore.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows :

CHAP. 131.

Tax of town of
Bethel abated
\$36 18.

SECT. 1. The sum of eighty six dollars and eighteen cents is hereby abated, to the town of Bethel, in the county of Oxford, from the state tax, assessed on said town in and by virtue of the tax act, approved on the twenty fourth day of March, in the year one thousand eight hundred and forty three, the same being the amount of an over-assessment upon the polls and estates of said town.

Tax of Howard's
gore abated,
\$30 71.

SECT. 2. The sum of thirty dollars and seventy one cents is hereby abated, to the plantation, called Howard's gore, in the county of Oxford, from the state tax assessed thereon, in and by virtue of the tax act aforesaid, the same sum having been assessed on said plantation after its incorporation into the town of Hanover.

Chapter 131.

AN ACT to incorporate the Bangor Mercantile Association.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows :

Names of cor-
porators.

SECT. 1. James Crosby, Jabez True, George W. Pickering, Cyrus Goss, Francis M. Sabine, Thomas H. Sandford, Joseph C. Stevens and William H. Dow, with their associates and successors, hereby are created a body corporate, by the name of the Bangor Mercantile Association, for the purpose of establishing a library and adopting such other measures as they may deem expedient, for mutual improvement, and the promotion of a spirit of useful enquiry, upon mercantile and other subjects of general utility; with power to prosecute and defend suits at law; to have a common seal; to elect such officers as they may deem necessary; to make any by-laws for the regulation of their affairs, not repugnant to the laws of this state; and to exercise and enjoy such other powers and privileges, as are incident to all similar grants.

SECT. 2. The said association may purchase and hold real and personal estate, the annual income of which shall not exceed fifteen hundred dollars, and may give, grant, devise, lease, or sell the same, at pleasure.

First meeting,
how called.

SECT. 3. Any two of the persons named in the first section of this act hereby are authorized to call the first meeting of said association, at such time and place as they may direct, by giving notice seven days previous thereto in some newspaper printed in the city of Bangor.
