Chapter 151.

AN ACT for the relief of the Dresden Neck Bridge Company.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:

Additional powers for erecting piers. SECT. 1. The Dresden Neck Bridge Company is hereby authorized to have and maintain side piers, or wing piers, of less than seventy feet in length, but not less than fifty feet, at the draw in their said bridge.

SECT. 2. This act shall take effect and be in force, from and after its approval by the governor.

Chapter 152.

AN ACT in addition to "an act to unite the Maine, New Hampshire and Massachusetts Rail Road Corporation with the Boston and Maine Rail Road."

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:

Liabilities defined. SECT. 1. Nothing contained in the act to which this is additional, is intended, or shall be so construed as to subject the said united corporations to any other duties, liabilities or laws, than such as the said Maine, New Hampshire and Massachusetts Rail Road Corporation might have been subjected to, in case the said act, to which this is in addition, had not passed.

This act shall be a part of the act of union.

SECT. 2. This act, when accepted by the said corporation, shall be considered part and parcel of the said act of union, and one of the terms and conditions thereof.

Chapter 153.

 ΛN ΛCT to authorize the sale of the first Congregational meeting house in Vassalborough.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:

Names of persons authorized to effect a sale.

Sect. 1. Samuel Redington, John G. Hall and Thomas Carlton, part owners of the first Congregational meeting house in Vassalborough, be authorized and empowered to sell, convey or dispose of said house in such manner as they may deem expedient,
