PRIVATE AND SPECIAL LAWS

Chapter 170.

AN ACT to incorporate the St. Albans Woolen Manufacturing Company.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:

Chase Wiggins, Orrin Carrier, Levi J. Merrick, Abram Moor, Enoch E. Brown, John Page and Thomas Smith, with their associates, are constituted and made a body politic and corporate by the name of the St. Albans Woolen Manufacturing Company, and they are hereby authorized to purchase and hold real and personal estate, to an amount not exceeding thirty thousand dollars, for the purpose of manufacturing wool, into cloth, in all its various branches, at the west village in St. Albans; and said corporation may erect such mills, dams, machines and buildings, as may be necessary for carrying on said manufacturing business, and shall have all the powers and privileges, and be subject to all the duties and requirements, expressed in the laws of this State relating to manufacturing corporations.

Chapter 171.

AN ACT to set off a part of the town of New Vineyard and annex the same to the town of Industry.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:

SECT. 1. All that part of the town of New Vineyard, in the county of Franklin, lying east and south of a line commencing at the south line of said town; thence running north between lots number ten and eleven in the first range, in said town, to the middle of range number four; thence through the middle of said range, to the eastern line of said town, together with the inhabitants thereon, be, and the same hereby is, set off from the town of New Vineyard, and annexed to the town of Industry, in said county.

Description of territory set off to town of Industry.

SECT. 2. The citizens, resident on that part of the town of New Vineyard, set off by the first section of this act, shall pay their proportion of all taxes heretofore assessed on said town, and pay their proportion of all debts due from said town, and support their proportion of all the paupers now chargeable to said town: provided they shall receive their proportion of all the school fund property, owned by said New Vineyard, all to be apportioned according to the valuation taken by the assessors of said town, in the year of our Lord, one thousand eight hundred and forty-three.

SECT. 3. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its approval by the governor.

Chapter 172.

AN ACT to incorporate the Kennebec Manufacturing Company.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows :

Names of corporators.

Ephraim Wood, Josiah Little, Thomas R. Jones, Josiah Little, jr. and their associates and successors, be, and they are hereby, constituted and made a body corporate and politic by the name of the Kennebec Manufacturing Company, with all the powers and privileges, and subject to all the duties and liabilities, provided in the laws of this state, concerning manufacturing corporations; and are authorized to purchase and hold real estate, not exceeding in value at any one time, the sum of fifty thousand dollars; and the same may improve, lease, sell and convey, as other proprietors of real and personal estate may lawfully do. And said company are authorized to carry on at Winthrop, the manufacture of cotton or wool and such other materials as may be necessarily or conveniently connected therewith, and may erect and construct such machinery, mills and other buildings, as may be useful for that purpose.

Chapter 173.

AN ACT to change the name of the corporation called the Augusta High School to Augusta Classical School.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows :

Augusta High School to be called Augusta Classical School.

SECT. 1. From and after the passage of this act, the corporation heretofore known by the name of "Augusta High School," is hereby changed to that of Augusta Classical School; and all records, contracts and other transactions, relating to, and binding upon, said corporation, and all other parties connected therewith, shall have the same binding effect as if the name of said corporation had not been changed.
