Chapter 316.

Resolve relative to the education of the deaf and dumb of the State of Maine.

Resolved, That the governor and council are hereby authorized Deaf and dumb. to place any and all pupils, being deaf and dumb, at the American Asylum established at Hartford, in the State of Connecticut, for and during such term of time as they may judge proper, not exceeding five years for any one pupil.
