PRIVATE AND SPECIAL LAWS

OF THE

STATE OF MAINE,

1845.

SECT. 2. The inhabitants of said town of Anson and North Anson shall be holden to pay the arrears of all taxes which have been legally assessed on them, and of assessments which may have been voted by said town of Anson, together with their proportion of all the debts due from the said town of Anson, at the time this act shall take effect ; and each of said towns shall be entitled to receive and hold their proportion of the debts and taxes due to said town of Anson ; said proportions to be ascertained by the last valuation of their respective towns.

Arrears of taxes.

Apportionment of debts and taxes due.

SECT. 3. All persons now chargeable as paupers to said town of Anson, shall be supported by the towns of Anson and North Anson in proportion to their present valuation.

Paupers.

SECT. 4. The several collectors of taxes for the town of Anson, are hereby authorized and empowered to collect and pay, all taxes to them already committed, agreeably to their several warrants ; and also all taxes which have been legally assessed, and which may be hereafter committed to said collectors.

Collection of taxes already assessed, &c.

SECT. 5. Until a new valuation shall be completed, all state and county taxes shall be assessed upon said towns in proportion to the present valuation.

State and county taxes.

SECT. 6. Until another general apportionment, the town of North Anson shall be classed with Anson for the choice of representative to the state legislature.

Representative district.

SECT. 7. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its approval by the governor.

Chapter 249.

AN ACT to provide in part for the expenditures of government.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows :

In order to provide for the operation of certain acts and resolves of the legislature, requiring the payment of money from the treasury, and also to provide for the necessary expenditures of government, for the current year, the following sums are hereby appropriated, to be paid out of any moneys in the treasury ; the same to be in lieu of all other existing appropriations whatever. And the governor, with the advice of the council, is hereby authorized, at any time prior to the first day of January next, to draw his warrant upon the treasurer for the same :

Chapter 250.

AN ACT to make valid the doings of the town of Orono.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows :

That the doings of the town meeting, held in said Orono, for the choice of town officers and for other purposes, for the year one thousand eight hundred and forty, are hereby declared to be valid,

Doings of the town of Orono in 1840, made valid.
