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**Chapter 179.**

**CHAP. 179.**

An Act establishing another regular session of the county commissioners for Kennebec county.

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows :*

**SECTION 1.** A third regular session of the county commissioners for Kennebec county, shall be holden at Augusta, on the second Tuesday of August, in each year, in addition to the regular sessions before provided for by law.

Establishing another regular session of the county commissioners for Kennebec county.

**SECT. 2.** This act shall take effect from and after its approval by the governor.

[Approved June 8, 1846.]

**Chapter 180.**

An Act additional in relation to the state library.

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows :*

**SECTION 1.** The chaplains of the two branches of the legislature, the secretary and assistant secretary of the senate, and the clerk and assistant clerk of the house, shall severally be allowed to take books from the state library, during the sessions of the legislature, under the rules and regulations of the library as established by law.

Certain officers allowed to take books from the state library.

**SECT. 2.** This act shall take effect from and after its approval by the governor.

[Approved June 11, 1846.]

**Chapter 181.**

An Act relating to the survey of the coast of Maine.

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows :*

**SECTION 1.** Any person employed under and by virtue of an act of the congress of the United States, passed the tenth day of February, one thousand eight hundred and seven, and the supplements thereto, may enter upon lands within this state for the purpose of exploring, surveying, triangulating, leveling and doing any other act which may be necessary to effect the object of said act, and may erect any works, stations, buildings or appendages, requisite for that purpose, doing no unnecessary injury thereby.

Persons duly authorized, may enter upon lands in this state for the purpose of exploring, &c.
