CHAP. 314.

habitant of this state, on whom process may be served.

General duties and liabilities.

When to take effect.

Subject to the provisions of an act of this state approved March 21, 1845.

Treasurer to publish statement required by act of March 21, 1844.

corporation shall at all times be an inhabitant of this state, on whom process against said company may be legally served; and said company shall be held to answer in the jurisdiction where the service is made and the process is returnable.

SECT. 3. The property of said company situated in this state, and the stockholders therein shall be subject to all the duties and liabilities of similar corporations, and the general laws of this state relating to manufacturing corporations.

SECT. 4. This act shall not take effect until the same, and also an act of the legislature of New Hampshire, authorizing the union of the said corporations shall have been accepted by the stockholders of the said two corporations at legal meetings called for that purpose.

SECT. 5. Said corporation shall be subject to the provisions contained in an act of the state of Maine, approved March twenty first, eighteen hundred and forty-five, entitled "an act extending the remedy on executions against corporations."

SECT. 6. The statements required by the provisions of an act in relation to manufacturing corporations, approved March twenty first, eighteen hundred and forty-four, to be published by the treasurers of such corporations, shall be published by the treasurer of this company in some newspaper printed in the county of York, and in case no paper is printed therein, then in some newspaper in an adjoining county.

Chapter 314.

An Act to incorporate the Trustees of the Somerset Academy.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:

Corporators.

John Ware, Charles Greene, Ebenezer Hutchinson, George Bisly, James S. Tobey, Joseph Potter, Benjamin F. Greene, John Tufts, jr., David P. Palmer, Joseph Hight and Cleopas Boyd, their associates and successors, are created a corporation by the

name and style of the Trustees of the Somerset Academy, said academy to be located at Athens in the county of Somerset, and by that name may sue and be sued; have a common seal; enact any

Powers and privileges.

by-laws for the management of their affairs not repugnant to the laws of this State; fill all vacancies occurring in their number; choose such officers as they may deem expedient; receive by do-

nation or otherwise, any estate real or personal, the annual income of which shall not exceed two thousand dollars; take and hold any property heretofore given or hereafter to be given to said academy; and apply the avails of such property exclusively to the promotion of education; and any three of the above named trustees may call the first meeting of said corporation.

Chapter 315.

An Act to incorporate the Katahdin Iron Works.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:

David Pingree, Samuel E. Cowes, Charles H. Ladd, John L. Hayes and Alexander H. Ladd with their associates and successors, are hereby constituted a body politic and corporate by the name of the Katahdin Iron Works, to be established in the county of Piscataquis, with all the powers and privileges, and subject to all the duties and liabilities, provided in the laws of this state concerning manufacturing corporations; and are authorized to purchase and hold real and personal estate, not exceeding in value, at any one time, the sum of three hundred thousand dollars; and the same to improve, lease, sell and convey, as other proprietors of real and personal estate may lawfully do, and said company are authorized to carry on the manufacture of iron and steel and convert to any useful purpose iron and other ores and mineral substances, on land which may be owned or leased by them in the county of Piscataquis and elsewhere; and the said corporation may erect or purchase and hold such buildings as may be necessary for the purposes aforesaid.

Chapter 316.

An Act to provide in part for the expenditures of government.
