PRIVATE AND SPECIAL LAWS

OF THE

STATE OF MAINE,

1846.

Chapter 318.

An Act to incorporate the Sabattis Pond and River Company.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows :

SECTION 1. Samuel Watts, John Lombard, William R. Frye, James Bryant, Benjamin D. Bryant, Horace Corbett and Samuel Moody, their associates, successors and assigns, are hereby incorporated and made a body politic, by the name of the Sabattis Pond and River Company, for the purpose of increasing and improving the water power of Sabattis pond and river ; and for this purpose said company may purchase and hold real and personal estate, not exceeding in value ten thousand dollars ; and erect and maintain such dams as they may think proper at the outlet of Sabattis pond and across Sabattis river ; and make excavations and canals subject to the provisions of the laws of this state ; with power to sue and be sued ; to establish by-laws for the regulation of the company ; *provided* they be not repugnant to the laws of the state ; and to enjoy all the rights, privileges and immunities of similar corporations.

SECT. 2. In the choice of officers and all transactions of company business the owners of such privilege shall be entitled to one vote and the sale or alienation of company property shall be with the consent of each of said voters.

SECT. 3. Each privilege and the erections and improvements thereon, on Sabattis river, shall be liable for its equal proportion of such expenditures as the company shall make for the improvement of the water power of said Sabattis pond and river ; and said company shall hold a lien on the same until such debts and liabilities are discharged ; *provided* that no privilege shall be liable or the owners thereof, for any of the company's expenditures until such privilege is occupied and improved.

SECT. 4. The first meeting of the said company may be called by any one of the persons named in this act, giving seven days notice and setting forth the time and place of said meeting.

SECT. 5. This bill shall take effect from and after its approval.
