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**Chapter 501.**

Resolve authorizing the land agent to release the claim of the state to certain lands, conveyed to settlers by conditional deed.

*Resolved,* That the land agent may release to the original purchaser or his assigns the right, title and interest of the state to any lands sold as settling land, since the passage of the act of March twenty-third, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred thirty-eight, entitled "an act additional to promote the sale and settlement of the public lands" and which may have been forfeited to the state provided the settling duties have been performed, and the amount due the state has been or shall be paid with interest by the first day of January in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and forty-seven, and provided also that in his opinion justice and good policy shall require such release.

**Chapter 502.**

Resolve in favor of William Black.

*Resolved,* That the governor and council are hereby authorized to examine or to appoint some person to examine the claim of honorable William Black of the city of Saint John to two lots of land under the treaty of Washington, and if found just and equitable to direct the land agent to deed the same to said Black or his assigns.

**Chapter 503.**

Resolve for the payment of accounts against the state.

*Resolved,* That there be paid out of the treasury to John Jackson the sum of six dollars, for publishing the laws passed in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and forty-five; also, to Daniel C. Stanwood for stationery the sum of thirty-five dollars, amounting in all to the sum of forty-one dollars.
