PRIVATE AND SPECIAL LAWS

OF THE

STATE OF MAINE,

1847.

SECT. 3. Said corporators are hereby authorized and empowered to exercise all the rights and privileges conferred upon such corporations by the laws of this state, and subject to all the liabilities and restrictions thereof.

Powers, privileges and liabilities.

Chapter 59.

An act to set off part of Unity Gore and annex the same to the town of Sebacook.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows :

SECT. 1. All that part of Unity Gore, in the county of Kennebec, which lies southerly of Sebacook river and within the following limits, commencing at the east line of the town of Sebacook, at a point where the north line of the range of lots lettered L, two, crosses said east line to the north east corner of check lot number two, in said range ; thence southerly on the east side of said check lot and continuing said southerly course to the said east line of the said town of Sebacook, is hereby set off from said Unity Gore and annexed to the town of Sebacook in said county.

Description of territory set off.

SECT. 2. The inhabitants on the territory aforesaid shall pay all taxes legally assessed on their polls or estates that remain due and unpaid, to the collector of Unity Gore ; all paupers having their legal settlement on the territory aforesaid shall hereafter be supported by the town of Sebacook.

Inhabitants holden to pay all taxes legally assessed. Paupers.

Chapter 60.

An act to incorporate the Gorham Boot and Shoe Manufacturing Company.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows :

SECT. 1. Edmund Libby, John Frink, Everett Wescott, Jacob Cash, Ansel Libby, John F. Smith, Clement Greely, William Silla, J. W. Leighton, Merrill Thomas, their associates, successors and assigns, are hereby created a body politic and corporate by the name of the Gorham Boot and Shoe Manufacturing Company, with all the powers and privileges and subject to all the duties and liabilities

CHAP. 61.

May hold and control real and personal estate.

provided in the laws of this state concerning manufacturing corporations, and are authorized to purchase and hold real and personal estate, not exceeding at any one time, the sum of twenty thousand dollars, and the same may improve, lease, sell and convey as other proprietors of real and personal estate may lawfully do; and are authorized to carry on at Gorham, in the county of Cumberland, the manufacture of boots and shoes and for that purpose may erect, construct or lease, such buildings and fixtures as may be necessarily connected therewith.

First meeting, how called.

SECT. 2. The first meeting of the corporation may be called by the first four persons named in this act by posting up in the said town of Gorham, in four different places, ten days at least before the time of meeting, written or printed notices of the time and place of such meeting.

Chapter 61.

An act to set off certain land from the town of Princeton and annex the same to the town of Baileyville.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:

Territory set off.

All that part of the farm of Isaiah Merryfield of Princeton, on which he now resides, lying in the town of Princeton, is hereby set off from said town and annexed to the town of Baileyville in the county of Washington; and the said Isaiah Merryfield shall pay all taxes legally assessed on his poll and estate that remain due and unpaid.

Taxes due, how paid.
