Chapter 10.

CHAP. 10.

Resolve for the repair of the military road.

Resolved, That the land agent is hereby authorized to expend a sum not exceeding five hundred dollars in repairing the military road and bridges thereon to be laid out at any time before the first day of August one thousand eight hundred and forty-eight.

Repair of military road, \$500.

Chapter 11.

Resolve authorizing a botanical survey of the state.

Resolved, That the governor with the advice and consent of council is hereby authorized to employ some suitable person to make a botanical survey of the state.

Governor authorized to employ some person to make said survey.

Resolved, That the person who shall be employed to make said survey shall deposit a complete suit of specimens of the flora of the state properly preserved and prepared and suitably labelled and arranged, and deposit the same in the public buildings, as the property of the state, and such person shall furnish such duplicates of said specimens as the governor and council may direct to be disposed of by them as they shall think proper.

Such person to deposit a complete suit of specimens of the flora of the state in the public buildings.

Duplicate specimens.

Resolved, That the sum of six hundred dollars be appropriated from the treasury, subject to the discretion of the governor and council to be expended by them in defraying the expense of said survey, upon such terms and conditions as they may think best, *provided*, that said survey can be finished for said sum.

Appropriation for defraying expenses.

Chapter 12.

Resolve authorizing the treasurer to make a temporary loan in behalf of the state.

Resolved, That the treasurer be, and he hereby is authorized to procure on the faith of the state, a loan not exceeding five per cent. on the capital stock actually paid in, of the several banks of this state, at any time the situation of the treasury may render it necessary, previous to the second Wednesday in May, in the year eighteen hundred and forty-eight, at a rate of interest not exceeding five per centum per annum.

Treasurer authorized to procure a loan on the faith of the state.

CHAP. 13.

Payment of said loan.

Resolved, That the treasurer be, and he hereby is directed, whenever he shall judge that the state of the treasury will permit without prejudice to other necessary purposes, to pay any or all of the requisition loan made by authority of the foregoing resolve.

Chapter 13.

Resolve relating to the Vattemarc scientific exchanges.

Appropriation for expenses, \$200.

Resolved, That a sum of money not exceeding two hundred dollars, is hereby appropriated, for the purpose of meeting any expenses that may occur to the state, on account of the scientific exchanges, with M. Vattemarc of Paris, France, and the governor is hereby authorized to draw his warrant upon the treasury for the same whenever called for, to meet said expenses.

Chapter 14.

Resolve in favor of Joseph Lolah Salmo.

In favor of Jos. Lolah Salmo.

Resolved, That there be paid out of the treasury of this state to Joseph Lolah Salmo sixty dollars, it being to remunerate him for expenses incurred in traveling to and fro from the seat of government as agent of the Passamaquoddy Indians, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and forty-seven.

Chapter 15.

Resolve concerning the deaf and dumb, and the blind in this state.

Return of the name, age, &c., to be made by aldermen, selectmen, and assessors.

Resolved, That the aldermen of cities, selectmen of towns, and assessors of plantations, in this state, before the twentieth day of May, eighteen hundred and forty-eight, return to the secretary of state, the names and ages of all deaf and dumb, and of all blind persons, residing in their respective cities, towns and plantations, on the first day of May, eighteen hundred and forty-eight, and
