### Снар. 44.

### Chapter 44.

An act in further regulation of the annual school funds.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:

Apportionment to unorganized places, discontinued. Sect. 1. The treasurer of State is hereby directed to discontinue the apportionment and distribution of the annual school funds to unincorporated or unorganized places; and hereafter the apportionment and distribution shall be made only to cities and towns and to those plantations which are duly organized for municipal or election purposes.

Sect. 2. This act shall take effect from and after its approval by the governor.

[Approved July 14, 1848.]

### Chapter 45.

An act to enlarge the powers of constables in executing criminal process.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:

Power to execute warrants issued by jus. of the peace. A warrant duly issued by a justice of the peace, for any supposed offense, committed in his county, or by any municipal or police court, may be executed by any constable of any city or town in the same county, to whom it may be directed.

### Chapter 46.

An act to regulate the sale of hair.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:

Standard weight, for a bushel.

From and after the passage of this act, the standard weight of hair, used in masonry, when well dried and cleansed, shall be eleven pounds for a bushel; and the measure shall be so determined, when either the vender or vendee shall require it.
