### Chapter 97.

Resolve in favor of Ephraim Sheldon.

*Resolved*, That there be paid out of any money in the treasury not otherwise appropriated, to Ephraim Sheldon of Waldo in the county of Waldo, semi-annually, the sum of seventeen dollars and fifty cents so long as the said Sheldon shall live. Pension, \$35 per annum.

### Chapter 98.

Resolves in relation to the state prison.

*Resolved*, That the warden of the state prison is hereby authorized and instructed, under the advice and direction of the inspectors, to commence the construction and erection of a building upon the old wing of the prison, to serve as a hospital and solitary cells for labor, and continue the same until completed, upon the plan reported by the committee, with such amendments as may be considered necessary by the warden and inspectors; and also to slate the roofs of the warden's house and the guard house. Construction of a building for hospital, &c.

*Resolved*, That there be appropriated and paid out of the state treasury to the warden of the state prison, a sum not exceeding two thousand dollars, to be expended under the direction and supervision of the inspectors, in carrying into execution the provisions of the foregoing resolve; and the governor is hereby authorized to draw his warrant for the whole or any part of said sum as in the opinion of said warden and inspectors may be required. Appropriation therefor.

*Resolved*, That the warden of the prison be instructed to provide a larger cell for any prisoner sentenced to solitary confinement, either by removing the partition between two of the cells or by constructing one in some other place, which may Larger cells to be constructed for prisoners sentenced to solitary confinement.

**Chapter 99.**

Resolve laying a tax on the county of Cumberland.

\$14,000.

*Resolved*, That the sum of fourteen thousand dollars is hereby granted as a tax for the county of Cumberland for the year one thousand eight hundred and forty-nine, to be apportioned, assessed, collected and applied for the purpose of paying the debts and necessary expenses of the same, and other purposes ordered by law.

**Chapter 100.**

Resolve to aid in the construction of the Great Machias Bridge.

Land agent to pay \$75.

Proviso.

Bridge to be built within one year.

*Resolved*, That the land agent is hereby authorized and directed to pay to the treasurer of plantation number eleven, the sum of seventy-five dollars, to aid in the construction of a bridge across the Great Machias river in township number eleven, range five west from the east line of the state, *provided*, Massachusetts shall pay a like sum; and *provided further*, if the inhabitants of said plantation and others interested, shall build said bridge within one year from the passage of this resolve. Said sum to be paid to the said treasurer upon his furnishing satisfactory evidence to the land agent that said bridge was built within the time specified in this resolve.

**Chapter 101.**

Resolve in addition to a "resolve in favor of the Passamaquoddy Indians."

Time for appointing agent to erect a mill.

*Resolved*, That the resolve entitled "resolve in favor of the Passamaquoddy Indians," approved July thirty-first, one thousand eight hundred and forty-six, is hereby amended as follows:
