Income, how apsilied.

CHAP. 342. income do not exceed the sum of three thousand dollars. Anđ the income thereof shall be faithfully applied to promote religious and temporal improvement and condition of the poor and depressed portion of the community by such modes of relief and ministration as they may judge best suited to the object.

Trustees, power to call meetings, Sec.

May elect officers.

The board of trustees shall consist of seven per-SECT. 3. sons, four of whom shall constitute a quorum; and they shall have power at any meeting duly called by personal notice to each member of the board, to fill all vacancies which may happen therein by death, removal from town, resignation or otherwise; and to elect a president, treasurer and such other officers as they may think necessary, who shall hold their offices until others are chosen in their stead. The pastor of the first parish in Portland shall "ex officio" belong to said board.

First meeting, how colled.

The first meeting of said corporation shall be SECT. 4. called by one of the corporators by giving a written notice three days before the meeting, specifying the time and place thereof.

SECT. 5. This act shall take effect immediately after its passage.

Chapter 342.

An act to prevent the destruction of pickerel in Sabattis pond.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:

If any person or persons within five years from the passage of this act at any time in the season of the year from the first day of October to the first day of June, shall in any manner take or destroy any pickerel in the Sabattis pond lying in the towns of Greene, Wales and Webster, or in any of the streams emptying into or issuing out of said pond, in said towns, he shall forfeit and pay a fine of five dollars for each pickerel so taken or destroyed. And all fines arising from a violation of this act may be recovered by an action of debt, one half thereof to the use of the town in which the offense is committed, and the other half to the use of the person who may sue for the same.
