Chapter 352.

An act to make valid the proceedings of the town of Sebasticook.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:

Certain acts made valid.

- SECT. 1. The proceedings of the town of Sebasticook and its officers in laying out a road and building a bridge across the Sebasticook river in said town, and in voting to raise money for said purpose and all acts of said officers in assessing money and collecting the same, are hereby made valid.
- SECT. 2. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its approval by the governor.

Chapter 353.

An act to authorize Joseph Smith to extend his wharf in Muscongus cove.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:

Authorized to extend wharf.

Joseph Smith is hereby authorized to extend the wharf which he now owns in Muscongus cove in the town of Bremen fifty feet further into the harbor, of the same width of his present wharf, and in the same direction as said wharf now runs.

Chapter 354.

An act to set off a part of the town of Hartford and annex the same to the town of Canton.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:

Part of Hartford annexed to Canton. SECT. 1. From and after the passage of this act, all that part of the town of Hartford, in the county of Oxford, which lies north of the following line, to wit: beginning at the southeast corner of lot number nine, and on the town line between the towns of Hartford and Livermore; thence west, to the southwest corner of said lot; thence north, to the northwest corner of said lot; thence west on the lot lines, to Benjamin Dearborn's

southwest corner; thence north on the lot line, to the town of Chap. 355. Canton,—is hereby set off from said town of Hartford and annexed to the town of Canton in said county.

The inhabitants on the territory aforesaid shall pay all taxes legally assessed on their polls or estates that remain due and unpaid, to the collector of said town of Hartford; and all persons now living and having their homes in that part of Hartford hereby annexed to Canton, and having their lawful settlement in said town of Hartford, and also Elizabeth Griffith, now a pauper of said Hartford; and all persons who have gained a settlement in said town of Hartford, by living and to Canton. having their homes on said territory hereby annexed to Canton, shall, from and after the passage of this act, be deemed to have their lawful settlements in the town of Canton.

Taxes assessed,

All persons having a residence on the territory set off, to belong

The inhabitants of the territory aforesaid, shall have their proportion of the school money now belonging to the town of Hartford, to be divided according to the number of scholars.

School money, how divided.

Chapter 355.

An act to incorporate the town of Kennebec.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:

The territory included within the following de- $_{\mbox{\footnotesize Boundaries}.}$ SECT. 1. scribed boundaries, to wit: beginning on the north line of Augusta, and on the east line of a gore at the end of the third mile from Kennebec river, thence southerly on the west line of said gore to land of Bethiah Knowles, thence easterly on the north line of said Knowles to land of Sewall Longfellow, thence to the east line of said gore, thence southerly, on the east line of said Longfellow's to land of William Goldthwait, thence easterly on the north line of said Goldthwait, to the northeast corner of said Goldthwait's land, thence southerly on the east line of said Goldthwait, and on the line of land owned by Timothy Goldthwait, junior, to land of the late Salmon Rockwood, thence easterly on the north line of said Rockwood, to said Rockwood's northeast corner, thence southerly to the northwest corner of land owned by Peter Atherton in Hallow-
