#### Chapter 365.

An act in addition to an act to incorporate the Lewiston Falls Village Corporation.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:

Sect. 1. That all property within the limits of the Lewis- Property to be taxed. ton Falls Village Corporation, liable to be assessed for the payment of state, county and town taxes, shall be assessed in like manner by said village corporation to accomplish the purposes mentioned in the act incorporating the same.

SECT. 2. So much of the act entitled an act to incorporate the Lewiston Falls Village Corporation, as is inconsistent with the provisions of this act are hereby repealed.

SECT. 3. This act shall take effect from and after its approval by the governor.

Inconsistent acts

#### Chapter 366.

An act to incorporate the Waldoborough Village Corporation.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:

SECT. 1. The territory embraced within the following lim- Territory. its in the town of Waldoborough, in Lincoln county and state of Maine, commencing at the northeast corner of captain Charles Samson's brick building in the village of said Waldoborough and extending one mile in distance therefrom in all directions, including all the territory therein, is hereby created a body politic and corporate, with all rights and privileges provided by the general laws of the state relating to corporations, by the name of the Waldoborough Village Corporation.

Corporate name.

Powers, &c.

SECT. 2. Said corporation is hereby authorized and vested with the power, at any legal meeting called for the purpose, to raise money to defray the expenses of a night watch, of a police and all other necessary regulations, for the better security of property and for the promotion of good order and quiet, within its limits; for the purchase of one or more engines, and all other apparatus for the extinguishment of fires; for the construction of reservoirs and aqueducts to supply water, for the erection of suitable engine houses, and for organizing and maintaining an efficient fire department.
