CHAP. 255.

it being the amount of taxes irregularly assessed on one-fourth part of township numbered five, fifth range, Oxford county and paid by said Herrick.

### Chapter 255.

Resolve granting certain power to the county commissioners of Penobscot county.

In favor of Jonathan Clay and Chandler Bruce.

*Resolved*, That the county commissioners of Penobscot county are hereby authorized to audit and order paid from the treasury of said county the claim of Jonathan Clay and Chandler Bruce for building a county road in the town of Mattamiscontis, if in the judgment of said commissioners the claim is just and reasonable.

### Chapter 256.

Resolve providing for the collection of statistics in relation to the several colleges and academies in this state.

Secretary of board of education authorized to collect statistics of schools and academies.

*Resolved*, That the secretary of the board of education be directed to collect and submit in tabular form, in his next annual report, statistics in reference to each college and incorporated academy in this state, the statistics to embrace the following particulars touching each institution: where located; when incorporated; how much land and how much money received from the state, specifying whether from this state or from Massachusetts; what proportion of the land so received has been sold and the amount realized from the sale of the same; the present value of the property owned by the corporation over and above the outstanding debts, specifying what proportion is real estate and what proportion is personal property; the number of weeks instruction given in each institution during the year; the average number of pupils attending and the average price of tuition.
