MAINE CONFERENCE.

Снар. 462.

Powers and privileges. Proviso.

May hold personal estate to the value of \$10,000.

Stock to be divided into shares.

First meeting, how called. boats; with power to sue and be sued; to use a common seal; to establish all necessary by-laws; to carry out the purposes of the incorporation; *provided* they be not repugnant to the laws of the State, and to enjoy all the rights, privileges and immunities, and be subject to all the duties and liabilities of similar corporations, as provided in the laws of this State.

SECT. 2. Said corporation may hold personal estate to the value of seventy-five thousand dollars, and real estate to the value of ten thousand dollars, as may be necessary for establishing and prosecuting the purposes of their incorporation; and may lease, sell, or otherwise dispose of the same; and may divide their stock into as many shares as they may think proper of not less than twenty dollars each.

SECT. 3. Any three of the corporators aforementioned, may call the first meeting by advertisement of the time, purposes and place thereof, in the Lincoln Democrat, a newspaper printed in New Castle, seven days at least before the time appointed for holding such meeting; and this act shall take effect, and be in force from and after its approval by the governor.

Chapter 462.

An act additional to an act to incorporate the Board of Education of the Maine Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, approved August tenth, one thousand eight hundred and forty-nine.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:

That all in the third section after the word "education," be striken out and the following inserted, under the direction of the Maine Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church or in accordance with the will of the donors.
