Chapter 466.

An act to incorporate the Cumberland Brick Manufacturing Company.

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives
 in Legislature assembled, as follows :*

SECT. 1. John Dow, Alvah Libby, William Parker, Elisha Corporators.
 Trowbridge and George Worcester, their associates and suc-
 cessors are hereby constituted a body politic and corporate, by Corporate
 the name of the Cumberland Brick Manufacturing Company, name.
 with all the powers and privileges necessary to effect the ob- Powers and
 jects of their association ; and subject to such duties, liabilities privileges.
 and exemptions as are or may be provided by the general laws
 of this state in the case of manufacturing corporations.

SECT. 2. The capital stock of said corporation shall not be Capital stock.
 less than twenty-five thousand dollars, nor more than fifty
 thousand dollars, and shall be divided into shares of five hun-
 dred dollars each.

SECT. 3. The management of the affairs of the said corpo- Affairs of the
 ration, and all expenditures made for purposes of this associa- company, how
 tion, shall be directed by a board of directors, to be chosen managed.
 annually, of such number as may be prescribed by the by-laws
 of the corporation.

SECT. 4. The accounts of the corporation shall be kept by Accounts, how
 a treasurer, who shall be chosen by the directors, and he shall kept, &c.
 be sworn to make and keep true and distinct accounts of all
 expenditures authorized by the directors and paid by him from
 the funds of the corporation ; and shall give such bonds as the
 directors may require, which bond shall be deposited with the
 president.
