CHAP. 489.**Chapter 489.**

An act to repeal an act entitled "an act to regulate the salmon, shad and alewife fisheries in the Kennebec river or its branches."

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:

Salmon, shad and alewife fisheries, relative to.

SECT. 1. Chapter four hundred and seven of the acts of the year eighteen hundred fifty, entitled "an act to regulate the salmon, shad and alewife fisheries in the Kennebec river and its branches, is hereby repealed.

SECT. 2. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its approval by the governor.

Chapter 490.

An act additional to the "act to incorporate the the city of Bath."

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:

Relating to the sale of wood and bark in Bath.

SECT. 1. The city council shall have authority to make and establish regulations for the measurement and sale of wood and bark in said city, whether brought by land or water, and to affix suitable penalties for the violation thereof, any thing in the public laws of the state to the contrary notwithstanding.

SECT. 2. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its approval by the governor.

Chapter 491.

An act to authorize the Portland Steam Packet Company to increase their capital stock.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:

Capital stock increased to \$200,000.

SECT. 1. The Portland Steam Packet Company are hereby authorized to take, purchase and hold real and personal estate to an amount not exceeding at any one time two hundred thousand dollars, instead of the amount now allowed by law, with full power to manage and dispose of the same.
