Chapter 385.

Снар. 385.

Resolves making an appropriation for the repairs of the state prison.

Resolved, That there be paid from the treasury of the state, out of any money not otherwise appropriated, the sum of three thousand six hundred dollars for the purpose of completing the repairs of the state prison.

Repairs of state prison.

Resolved, That the governor by and with the advice of the council, is hereby authorized to draw his warrant on the treasurer of state, in favor of the agent appointed under the resolve of June third, eighteen hundred and fifty-one, for that amount, for the purpose of defraying the expenses contemplated in the foregoing resolve.

Governor authorized to draw on treasurer.

Chapter 386.

Resolve in favor of Joseph Lolar.

Resolved, That there be paid out of the treasury of this state Representato Joseph Lolar, the sum of forty-five dollars, it being to remunerate him for expenses incurred in traveling to and from the seat of government as a representative from the Passamaquoddy tribe of Indians, in the year of our Lord eighteen hundred and fifty-two.

Chapter 387.

Resolve in favor of the town of Gray.

Whereas the town of Gray has lost by fire which occurred Certain books on the sixth day of October eighteen hundred and forty-nine, the Maine Reports from volume one to twenty-six inclusive, excepting volumes thirteen, twenty-one, and twenty-two, allowed them by law; therefore

Resolved, That the secretary of state be and is hereby authorized to supply said town of Gray with such copies as have been lost.
