**Chapter 400.**

CHAP. 400.

Resolve in favor of Leonard Trask.

*Resolved,* That there be paid out of the treasury of this state to Leonard Trask of Peru, the sum of eight dollars per month for the term of his natural life, commencing the first day of January eighteen hundred and fifty, in consequence of the loss of his health, while in the service of the state, in the year eighteen hundred and thirty-one. Pension.

[*Approved March 27, 1852.*]**Chapter 401.**

Resolve correcting the state valuation of the city of Augusta.

*Resolved,* That there be deducted from the valuation of the city of Augusta, twelve polls, and twenty-four thousand seven hundred and thirty-nine dollars and twelve cents; and the same be assigned to the town of Kennebec in the county of Kennebec, to take effect from and after its approval by the governor. Portion of valuation of Augusta assigned to Kennebec.

[*Approved March 27, 1852.*]**Chapter 402.**

Resolve authorizing the land agent to settle certain claims relating to the location of lands reserved for public uses.

*Resolved,* That the land agent be, and he hereby is authorized to audit and finally settle all out-standing claims for the location of the lands reserved for public uses in unincorporated places in the several counties in this state, and that said claims when audited and settled by the land agent, shall be paid out of the proceeds of the sales of the said lands or of timber sold therefrom, now in the hands of the land agent, or in the treasury of the state. Reserved lands, claims, how settled.
