ciates, successors and assigns, be and hereby are established a corporation, to be located at or near the "seven mile brook," so called, in the town of Vassalborough, by the name of the Vassalborough Company, for the purpose of manufacturing railroad cars, lumber, wood, iron, steel and such other raw materials as may be conveniently connected therewith; and by that name may sue or be sued, prosecute or defend suits at law; shall have a common seal, to be altered by them at pleasure; may make any by-laws for the management of their concerns, not repugnant to the laws of this state, and generally, shall be vested with and enjoy all the powers and privileges, and be subject to all the requirements and liabilities incident by law to such corporations.

CHAP. 34.

Location.

Purposes of corporation.

Seal.

Powers, privileges, &c.

May erect mills, &c.

SECT. 2. Said corporation may erect such mills, dams, works, machines and buildings on their own land, as may be necessary and useful in carrying on the business of said company; and may take and hold any real or personal estate to an amount not exceeding at any one time, in the whole, the value of two hundred thousand dollars.

SECT. 3. The first meeting of said corporation may be called by either one of the two first named corporators, by an advertisement in some public newspaper printed in Augusta, such advertisement to be published seven days at least before the time appointed for said meeting.

Chapter 34.

An act to incorporate the Cabot Company.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:

SECT. 1. Frederick Cabot, Ebenezer Everett and George F. Shepley, with their associates and assigns, are hereby created a body politic and corporate, by the name of the "Cabot Company," with all the powers and privileges, and subject to the duties and liabilities of similar corporations.

SECT. 2. Said corporation is authorized to carry on the manufacture of cotton, wool, iron and other articles, and to operate for all the purposes to which water power is usually applied, at Brunswick and Topsham, in this state; and may buy, hold and possess estates real and personal, to an amount not exceeding four hundred thousand dollars.

CHAP. 35.

SECT. 3. This act shall take effect from and after its approval by the governor.

Chapter 35.

An act to increase the capital stock of the Kenduskeag Plank Road Company.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows :

Capital stock
increased.

SECT. 1. The president, directors and company, of the Kenduskeag Plank Road Company, in the county of Penobscot, are hereby authorized to increase the capital stock of said company, by adding thereto the sum of twenty-five thousand dollars, and to be divided into shares of one hundred dollars each; and a certificate of the same, signed by the president and secretary of said company, shall, within ninety days from the passage of this act, be filed for record in the office of the register of deeds for the county of Penobscot.

SECT. 2. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its approval by the governor.

Chapter 36.

An act to incorporate the Proprietors of the Universalist Meetinghouse in Bath, into a parish.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows :

Corporators.

SECT. 1. Nelson B. West, Benjamin Small, Davis Hatch, and the other proprietors of the Universalist Meetinghouse in Bath, and of the land thereto belonging, are hereby incorporated into a parish, and, as such, are invested with all the powers and privileges conferred by the eighteenth chapter of the revised statutes on parishes incorporated in pursuance of the provisions contained in said chapter.
