Chapter 78.

An act to incorporate the Trustees of Raymond Academy.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:

Washington Jordan, Wentworth R. Lane, Ebenezer Corporators. SECT. 1. Jordan, John Nash, James Jordan, Freeman Jordan, with their associates and successors, are hereby constituted a corporation by the name of the Trustees of Raymond Academy; and by this Corporate name may sue and be sued, have a common seal, make such by-laws, not represent to the constitution and laws of this state, as they may deem expedient for the management of their affairs. fill all vacancies occurring in their number, take and hold any estate, personal and real, which they may receive by donation or otherwise, the annual income of which shall not exceed two thousand dollars, said income to be faithfully applied to promote the cause of education; and the trustees aforesaid are intrusted with all the powers and privileges incident to similar corporations.

Any two persons above named may call the first First meeting, SECT. 2. meeting of said corporation by giving a written notice thereof to the above named persons, seven days at least prior to said meeting.

SECT. 3. This act shall take effect from and after its approval by the governor.

Chapter 79.

An act to enable the proprietors of the Union meetinghouse at Farmington Falls to make alterations in the same.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:

The proprietors of the pews in the Union meeting-SECT. 1. house at Farmington Falls are hereby authorized to alter the arrangement of their meetinghouse, by changing the location of the pulpit from the west to the east end of the house; the pews to be turned round, and numbered in such manner as to give each pew, so far as practicable, the same relative position to the pulpit, and value, that it now has, and any other alterations as they may think proper; provided, that a majority of the owners Provise. of pews in said house consent to such alterations.
