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shall become possessed within this state or elsewhere of mines or minerals as aforesaid, they shall be empowered to establish, under such names as may be selected, a separate and distinct interest for each, and in like manner may organize under the same, and with all the privileges and rights fixed in this act.

CHAP. 185.

Separate organizations.

SECT. 4. The first meeting for the organization of a company under this act may be held at such time and place as may be agreed upon in writing by the incorporators or a majority of them.

First meeting.

SECT. 5. This act shall be in effect from and after the day of its passage.

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### Chapter 185.

An act to provide in part for the expenditures of government.

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:*

SECT. 1. In order to provide for certain acts and resolves of the legislature, requiring the payment of money from the treasury, and also to provide for the necessary expenditures of government for the current fiscal year, the following sums are hereby appropriated to be paid out of any moneys in the treasury. And the governor with the advice and consent of the council, is hereby authorized, at any time prior to the first day of January, eighteen hundred and fifty-four, to draw his warrant upon the treasury for the same.
