Chapter 31.

Resolve in favor of Thomas Taylor.

Resolved, That there be paid out of the treasury to Thomas Taylor of Strong, four dollars per month, for two years, for injuries received while in the service of the state. Pension.

Chapter 32.

Resolve in favor of Arthur L. Grant.

Resolved, That there be paid from the treasury of this state to Arthur L. Grant, four dollars per month, for two years, for injuries received while in the service of the state. Pension.

Chapter 33.

Resolve relating to the exchange of fire arms belonging to the state.

Resolved, That the senators in congress from this state be instructed, and the representatives requested, to adopt all suitable and proper measures to secure the following object, viz : Fire arms.

The exchange with the United States of all or any portion of the flint lock small arms belonging to the State of Maine, and originally furnished by the United States, for the money value

of said arms, as assumed at the time of their issue, in the latest improved percussion muskets and rifles, with their respective appendages, manufactured by the United States at their armories, or in such other ordnance and ordnance stores as may be designated by the governor and council.

Resolved, That the governor be and he is hereby requested to transmit copies of the foregoing resolution to each of our senators and representatives in congress.

Chapter 34.

Resolve in favor of Eli Goss.

Pension.

Resolved, That there be paid out of the treasury of this state to Eli Goss of Portland, the sum of eight dollars per month for two years, for injuries received while in the service of the state.

Chapter 35.

Resolve in favor of Thomas Briggs.

Pension.

Resolved, That there be paid out of the state treasury to Thomas Briggs, four dollars per month during the pleasure of the legislature, for injuries received while in the service of the state.
