Chapter 47.

CHAP. 47.

Resolve in favor of Prince Thomas, junior.

Resolved, That the governor and council be directed to investigate the claim of Prince Thomas, junior, for services for the state in the years eighteen hundred and thirty-nine and eighteen hundred and forty, and award to him the balance of his pay due, if any, with interest thereon.

Claim, investigation of.

Chapter 48.

Resolve relating to the claims of Samuel L. Harris.

Resolved, That the governor and council be authorized to settle with Samuel L. Harris, for services rendered by him as agent in establishing the claims of the state on the United States, for advances made in the Aroostook war, and interest on the same; and for such balance as may be allowed to be due, the governor is hereby authorized to draw his warrant on the treasurer, to be charged by him to account of interest.

Chapter 49.

Resolves providing for the completion of the Reform School building.

Resolved, That there be and hereby is appropriated, to be paid out of the treasury of the state, for the completion of the State Reform School building, the sum of eighteen thousand dollars.

Reform School building, completion of.

Resolved, That the governor and council be directed to purchase of the city of Portland, the fee of the Reform School farm, if the same can be purchased at a fair and reasonable price, and that the governor draw his warrant for the payment of the same on the treasurer, and to pay outstanding bills.

Farm, purchase of.
