Harbor master. appointment and

The city council of said city may annually elect or appoint one or more harbor masters, whose duty it shall be to enforce the observance of the by-laws or ordinances as aforesaid, and to exercise such powers as may be conferred upon them by the laws or ordinances of said city.

Chapter 333.

An act to incorporate the Searsport Mill Company.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:

Corporators

Hiram Porter, Jeremiah Merithew, John Shirley, John Carver, Henry Matthews, Isaac Carver and William Butman, their associates, successors and assigns, are hereby constituted and made a body politic and corporate, by the name of the Searsport Mill Company, with all the powers and privileges, and subject to all the duties and liabilities provided in the laws of this state, concerning manufacturing corporations.

Corporate name.

Authorized to erect mills, machinery, &c.

May purchase and hold real and personal estafe. Shares.

&c,

Authorized to construct dams,

First meeting.

Said corporation is authorized to purchase or construct and carry on a grist mill and any other machinery, for the manufacture of wood, iron, or any other material, the manufacture of which is not contrary to the laws of this state; and to purchase and hold real and personal estate for the purposes aforesaid, not exceeding in value, at any one time, the sum of ten thousand dollars, which may be divided into shares as said company may deem convenient; and to construct and maintain upon their own lands suitable dams, buildings and machinery, for the purposes aforesaid; and to sell or dispose of their property as other similar corporations are allowed by law to do.

SECT. 3. Either of said corporators may call the first meeting of this corporation, by posting a notice of the time and place thereof in a public and conspicuous place in Searsport village in the county of Waldo, one week, at least, before the time of such meeting.

This act shall take effect and be in force from and Sect. 4. after its approval by the governor.
