west by number four in the third range of townships in the said county of Franklin, is hereby incorporated into a town by the name of Rangely. And the inhabitants of said town are hereby vested with all the powers, privileges and immunities which the inhabitants of towns in this state do or may enjoy by law. CHAP. 480.
Powers, privileges, &c.

SECT. 2. Any justice of the peace within the said county of Franklin is hereby empowered to issue his warrant to some inhabitant of said town, directing him to notify the inhabitants thereof to meet at such time and place as he shall appoint, to choose such officers as other towns are empowered to choose at their annual town meetings. First meeting,
how called.

SECT. 3. This act shall take effect and be in force, from and after Thursday the twenty-ninth day of March next.

Chapter 480.

An act to incorporate the Novelty Bagging Company.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:

SECT. 1. George Copeland, Charles H. Doughty, Samuel Garland and Samuel A. Eveleth, their associates, successors, and assigns, are hereby incorporated into a company by the name of the Novelty Bagging Company, with all the privileges and immunities, and subject to all the duties and liabilities of corporations, as defined by the laws of this state. Corporators.
Corporate name.
Powers and privileges.

SECT. 2. This corporation is hereby authorized to purchase, hold, improve, lease, or sell real estate, to an amount not exceeding at any one time the value of one hundred thousand dollars, and to divide the same into shares as may be by them deemed convenient. May hold real estate not exceeding \$100,000.
Shares.

SECT. 3. This corporation is hereby authorized to carry on the manufacture and sale of articles of cotton, wool, hemp, iron and steel, and such other materials as may be conveniently connected therewith, in the towns of Gray or Windham. Purpose of corporation.

SECT. 4. Either of said corporators may call the first meeting of said incorporation, by giving seven days personal notice to the other members. First meeting.

SECT. 5. This act to take effect from and after its approval by the governor.
