CHAP. 506. effect, shall be known and be called by the name which he is allowed to take as aforesaid, and the same shall hereafter be considered his true and proper name.

> Sect. 2. This act shall take effect upon its approval by the governor.

Chapter 506.

An act to authorize the extension of the steamboat wharf, in Searsport, into the tide waters of the Penobscot bay.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:

Authorized to extend wharf.

SECT. 1. William McGilvery, Jeremiah Merithew and their associates, who are the owners of the steamboat wharf in Searsport, are hereby authorized to continue said wharf, as it now stands, extending into the tide waters of Penobscot bay, and to have and exercise the same rights, privileges and immunities, as if said wharf had originally been built by authority of an act of the legislature.

Rights, privi-leges, &c.

SECT. 2. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its approval by the governor.

Chapter 507.

An act additional to an act to establish the Kennebec and Wiscasset Railroad Company.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:

Authorized to extend R. R.

Sect. 1. The Kennebec and Wiscasset railroad company are hereby authorized to extend their road over and across the Kennebec. river, from the north-western terminus of their road in the town of Pittston or Dresden, to some point in the town of Richmond, and there to connect with the Kennebec and Portland railroad; and for that purpose said company are authorized to cross over the town of Perkins, lying in said Kennebec river, by a suitable bridge.

Bridge, when to be built, &c.

Said bridge shall not be built until said railroad shall have been surveyed and located and operations thereon commenced, and shall be used for no other purpose or travel than that connected with said railroad; shall be constructed on the most approved man-

-how to be constructed.
